

Critics have compared it to pineapples, hedgehogs, and giant fly eyes, but the slings and arrows of aesthetic judgment have failed to dent Singapore's enthusiasm for its new Esplanade arts center. Within the spiky steel-and-glass exteriors are a 2,000-seat theater, a 1,600-seat concert hall, and myriad smaller spaces where programs of music, dance, and drama will soon unfold year-round. In typical Singaporean fashion, the government recruited the world's top sound technicians and theater planners to create this \$350 million complex. But, less typically for the city, the center's off-the-wall architecture has sparked fierce public debate. Starting October 12, judge for yourself during the opening three-week performing arts fest, which will feature everything from American jazz to traditional Cantonese opera and Indonesian dance (esplanade.com).
